

 MSP should be seen as a process of giving a voice to all stakeholders.







PRINCIPLES OF EFFECTIVE MULTI-LEVEL CONSULTATION PROCESS


- Participation oriented project for all sectors and stakeholders,
- Stakeholders' education in terms of scope and legal formula of marine plans, also its influence on their interests while adopted;
- Clearly defined aims and parameters of the consultation
- Wide range of Stakeholders involved,
- At earliest project development stage,
- Transparency of consultations' procedure clearly defined stages and forms/types of participations communication and participation
- Transparency of decisions and planning solutions
- Development and effective communication tools (dedicated website, etc).
- Clear feedback methods




Leading questions

- and HOW it should be done.



The relevant stakeholders at different levels (from Baltic-to local) are informed about start of MSP including BSR MSP contact points of neighbouring countries			
Existing soft and hard law at global (conventions) EU, Baltic (e.g. HELCOM recommendations) national level are screened with regard to multilevel consultations			
Strategy of multi-level consultations have been prepared and agreed by the planning team including stakeholders list, consultations channels, time, and expected outcomes			
Asking cross-border level how, on what and when it wish to be consulted (gentlemen agreement on that)

Asking regional authorities how, on what and when they wish to be consulted (gentlemen agreement on that)			
Asking selected local authorities how, on what and when they want to be consulted(gentlemen agreement on that)
