




Briefly on Macro-regional Cooperation

EU Strategy for the Baltic Sea Region (EUSBSR) is one of 4 EU macro-regional strategies.

A 'Macroregional strategy' is **an integrated framework** endorsed by the European Council **to address common challenges** faced by a defined geographical area.

The Contracting Parties signed the first Helsinki Convention in 1974 and updated it in 1992. The current Convention entered into force in 2000.

Decision making in **HELCOM**

The highest decision-making body in HELCOM is the Ministerial Meeting (the meeting of the HELCOM line ministers of each CP) that takes place every three years.

> The Helsinki Commission meets annually and is also entitled to make decisions. Its participants are designated by the CPs.

The Heads of Delegation meet twice per year and are also authorised to make decisions on behalf of the CPs.




Intergovernmental collaboration on spatial planning and development in the Baltic Sea Region

Since 1992 & most recent **joint framework** is **VASAB Vision 2040**






Long-term territorial perspective for a vibrant, resilient, wellconnected Region with diversity, sustainability, integration and cooperation as key values



MSP at Macro-regional Scale






EUSBSR Policy Area Spatial Planning:

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Goal:


Draw up and apply maritime spatial plans throughout the Baltic Sea Region by 2020



Maritime Spatial Planning (Governance) at Macro-regional Scale in BSR

First/Initial/Some Conclusions for possible consideration/discussion

- MSP objectives reflect the values of VASAB and HELCOM (MSP is environmentally oriented)
- Very well operating/performing at macroregional level with clear vison, goals and well equipped with guiding documents for stakeholders (MSP planners)
- More efforts are needed to:
 - engage with local and regional governance levels (to enhance multilevel-governance, land-sea interactions);
 - deliver macroregional MSP knowledge to local and regional stakeholders;
 - boost cross-sectoral dialogue to support economies and effective/sustainable use of (sea) space (EBA guidelines)
