


Introduction & Context

Coastal accessibility is a growing concern in Baltic Sea Region.

Tension between **public access** and **private ownership**.

Saaremaa island reflects wider regional patterns.



Challenges in landscape

Privatization reduces traditional community pathways.

Conflicts over boat landing sites and shoreline rights.

Local dissatisfaction and loss of cultural connections.





Environmental and Cultural Dimensions


Balancing ecological preservation with public access.

Research approaches

- 1. Stakeholder Workshops and surveys local voices, access mapping
- 2. Participatory GIS mapping access points and problem zones (right image)
- 3. Knowledge Gap Analysis identifying missing data
- 4. Collaborative Tools Navigator platform integration




Solutions

Trail Development to connect people, promote tourism



Region.




Conclusion
